A broadly skilled team of faculty from all participating institutions work as facilitators and mentors as well as being actively engaged in projects as on an equal level, thereby establishing a safe and neutral learning environment. All students and staff establish a strong network of practitioners, which will build the foundations for ongoing collaboration throughout the two years and in some cases beyond, after the students return to their home
